Proposed 2020 - 2021 Budget

THANK YOU for your faithful giving to the General Operating Fund and to various designated persons and projects! Your generosity allows International Church to continue helping people love God, love people, serve, and engage the world.

The unfortunate reality is that the many costs continue to increase. All aspects of the budget were analyzed and adjusted to fit the projected ministry needs for fiscal year July 2020 to June 2021, particularly considering the Covid-19 pandemic. The major changes related to staffing are the inclusion of the Worship Director (previously paid from savings) and retirement benefits in the annual budget. We have included last year's budget for comparison.

Shortly after learning to use the "big boy" toilet, in 1969 at 30 months of age, I took a break from playing two-square with my friend Kyle to discuss with his mother the differences between Buddhism and Christianity.

I actually don't remember the day in quite that much detail, but that's how my Dad liked to tell the story and I did get your attention! As a result of



the conversation with my friend's mother, I asked my Dad some questions and came to understand that I hadn't met God's standard and accepted Christ's sacrifice to meet that standard. I still don't have answers to all my questions, but when I was a freshman in college, I reevaluated my faith and committed to follow Christ. I have kept that commitment imperfectly—since then.

Beth and I met in college in San Diego, California. We dated through college and then long distance for two years, while I was at law school in Connecticut and Beth was working in California. This was before free long distance, text messages, and voiceover internet, so we spent more on phone bills than food. To save money (and because we liked each other), we got married. I finished law school, Beth finished graduate school, Christa (now 26) was born, and we relocated permanently to Hawaii in 1995 (after working for a few years in Arizona). We found International Church about a year later.

Beth has recently finished homeschooling the last of our three children: Christa (a newly minted medical doctor moving to Sacramento for residency), Caleb (22, in graduate school for applied theology) and Charis (19, in college for pre-physical therapy). I work as an attorney in private practice, help manage some real estate, and regularly visit my Mom in California—because we have great times together and she occasionally needs my help. As a family, we enjoy boogie boarding, and I enjoy running around Diamond Head once a week while listening to audio books.

I hope that my work, life, and service experiences will add a helpful perspective to the Deacon Board, and I look forward to the encouragement of spending time with the current deacons.

Garrett Halweg

I grew up in a Christian home in California and came to Hawaii for medical school. In 2003, I was the Chief Resident at University of Hawaii Queen's Medical Center before beginning my career working in the California prisons, traveling between 9 different facilities examining death row inmates and attending to the mental health needs of prisoners. I learned the light shines brightest in the dark corners on this planet. Prisons are filled with guards and staff holding a dehumanizing view seeing prisoners as 'other'. Prisoners divide among races and often resist efforts at rehabilitation. In this dark place, I saw EQUALITY in Jesus. We ALL have this same need for mercy that only Jesus offers.

In 2013, while swimming in Maunawili falls I contracted Leptospirosis which turned into Weil's disease and multi-system organ failure. I was placed on a ventilator



and in a coma for 6 days during which time I had a near death experience. Aja, who was not yet a Christian at the time,

encountered God and came to faith in Jesus through this difficult time. We were married the following year after a miraculous recovery. I now teach patients in Hawaii and internationally about optimizing their brain function and recognizing how behaviors influence different emotional states of our mind.

Aja has a Master's from the London School of Economics and functions as our missions department. We have served on various mission trips in Israel, El Salvador, Kenya, Uganda, Japan, Cambodia, Guatemala, and Indonesia. We served together on the boards of Hawaii Life Alliance, protecting the sanctity of life from conception, and the Global Belief Project, bringing clean water through wells, evangelism, and discipleship in Uganda.

I have a passion for apologetics (a logical explanation of the rational trust found ONLY in the hope of Jesus), regularly teach on topics like evolution and sexual ethics for churches, conferences, podcasts, and radio programs. I am convinced dark chocolate dunked in an almond latte is proof God loves us and wants us to be happy! I enjoy kitesurfing and catching big air in Kailua or long boarding at Publics in Waikiki.

But the thing I like to brag about the most: I am a sinner like the common beggar on the corner looking for some food in desperate need of the Mercy & Grace from Jesus OUR Messiah. My purpose in life is to share with the world how good the bread of life tastes and how sweet the fruit of the vine from the tree of life. This is our appreciation for the great thing the Lord is doing in the transformation of my wife and me.
